Qualitative Comparative Analysis (QCA) offers a new, systematic way of studying configurations of cases. QCA is used in comparative research and when using case-study research methods. The QCA analysts interprets the data qualitatively whilst also looking at causality between the variables.

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Two features define comparative analysis as understood here: 1. an interest in the explanatory question of why the observed similarities and differences between cases exist, and 2. reliance on the collection of data on two or more cases, ideally according to a common framework.2.
